

ECTOPIC PREGNANCY CAN BE LIFE-THREATENING

Symptoms

- May occur from 4-12 weeks destation or later
- Vary and can resemble other conditions, e.g. gastrointestinal conditions, miscarriage, UTI



Unusual period

Usually a positive pregnancy test



Unusual vaginal bleeding Abdominal/pelvic pain









Shoulder tip pain

Shock or collapse



With a suspected ectopic pregnancy:

- If a patient is showing signs of haemodynamic instability (including pallor, tachycardia, low oxygen level, hypotension, shock and collapse),
- triggers Early Warning Score, or
- there is concern about the degree of bleeding or pain, arrange immediate ambulance

transfer to hospital (inform on-call gynaecology).

If immediate hospital transfer is not indicated:

- complete urine pregnancy test (if not already done); and
- if pregnancy is confirmed, refer to early pregnancy unit.
